Information for young people aged 9–12



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




What is the project about?



Many people live with health problems. We are a team of doctors, nurses and scientists working to find out why people become unwell and how we can improve everyone's health.



We would like to ask you to help us with research into why people become unwell by joining D-CYPHR, the DNA, Children + Young People's Health Resource.

D-CYPHR is part of the **National Institute for Health and Care Research** (NIHR) BioResource.

The **NIHR BioResource** is a project helping to understand how our bodies work and why some people develop health problems.

We are asking young people and adults if they would like to help. Your parent/guardian will also need to agree that you can take part.

What will I have to do?

If you would like to take part, we will ask you to answer some questions about yourself, either online or on paper. We will ask you to give us some of your saliva (spit) by spitting in a tube.







We will use your saliva (spit) and the answers you give to help us understand rare and common diseases. We want to know how we can improve treatments or prevent these conditions.

You don't have to take part and you can ask us any questions you like before deciding.





How will my saliva (spit) help?

We want to find out more about how our bodies work.

Our bodies are made up of millions of tiny building blocks called cells. Inside each cell is a set of instructions on how to make our bodies work. These instructions are called DNA.

DNA in the cells in your eyes makes your eyes the colour that they are, and the colour of your hair depends on the DNA in your hair cells.

DNA is in every cell, and it is important to keep cells working normally and keep us healthy. We can find your DNA in cells in your saliva.



Scientists can look at DNA to understand more about why things go wrong. They use this to try to find treatments and help improve people's health.





What happens after I join?

How we will use your saliva (spit) sample:

Your saliva is given a unique number and taken to our laboratory, where scientists will start to look for your cells and DNA. Your samples are stored to use in future research.







How we might ask you to help in the future:

We might also invite you to help with other research projects.

We will:

- let you know why we have invited you to help
- you can choose whether you want to take part

It's ok if:

- you change your mind and don't want to take part anymore
- you don't want to be invited to studies in the future





If you change your mind and stop taking part you don't have to tell us why.

Your samples and information will be stored securely and only be used to help with medical research.

How do I join?

Look at the website	If you and your parent/guardian(s) would like to know more about the project, you will be given a link to the D-CYPHR website.

Ask questions	You can ask us any questions you like, and you don't have to agree to take part.
Read information	 This will include: Details about D-CYPHR A consent form for your parent/guardian(s) An assent form for you to sign. If you sign the assent form this will say that you are happy to take part in D-CYPHR.





Complete forms



If you choose to join online, your parent/guardian(s) will be sent an email with forms for you both to complete.

If you are sent the forms in the post, you and your parent/guardian will fill out the forms and then send these back to us.

Spit in a tube

Next, we will send you a tube to collect your saliva in.



We will ask you to spit or dribble into the tube in the sample pack and return it to us.

Answer questions



We will ask you to answer some questions about yourself and your family (online or on paper).

You will be asked about:

- Your medical history
- How you spend your free time, your friends, your family, and school – you can decide if you want to fill this one out or not.


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• Fill in forms with a parent/guardian's help

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


